## Praying the Scriptures With THE FOUR SENSES

Understanding the four senses of Scripture will provide you with an interpretive key for unlocking many spiritual treasures in the Word of God. They can help you draw vital connections between the Old Testament, the New Testament, the Catholic Faith, and your own spiritual life. With this approach, we see more clearly that the events and people mentioned in the Bible are not distant realities, far removed from our day-to-day experience in the 20th century, but rather they are intimately linked to our own Christian lives and serve as models. #### taken from the Catechism of the Catholic Church

115 According to an ancient tradition, one can distinguish between two *senses* of Scripture: the literal and the spiritual, the latter being subdivided into the allegorical, moral, and anagogical senses. The profound concordance of the four senses guarantees all its richness to the living reading of Scripture in the Church.

116 The *literal sense* is the meaning conveyed by the words of Scripture and discovered by exegesis, following the rules of sound interpretation: "All other senses of Sacred Scripture are based on the literal."

117 The *spiritual sense*. Thanks to the unity of God's plan, not only the text of Scripture but also the realities and events about which it speaks can be signs.

- 1. The *allegorical sense*. We can acquire a more profound understanding of events by recognizing their significance in Christ; thus the crossing of the Red Sea is a sign or type of Christ's victory and also of Christian Baptism.
- 2. The *moral sense.* The events reported in Scripture ought to lead us to act justly. As St. Paul says, they were written "for our instruction."
- 3. The *anagogical sense* (Greek: anagoge, "leading"). We can view realities and events in terms of their eternal significance, leading us toward our true homeland: thus the Church on earth is a sign of the heavenly Jerusalem.

# Praying With Scripture Using

Lectio Divina has been likened to "Feasting on the Word." The four parts are first taking a bite (lectio), then chewing on it (meditatio). Next is the opportunity to savor the essence of it (oratio). Finally, the Word is digested and made a part of the body (contemplatio).

#### Reading / Listening

Read the Scripture passage slowly and intentionally, listening as if God is saying it directly to you, because He is doing just that.

#### Meditate

What is the word/phrase that really spoke to you in this passage? Pick a word/phrase that stands out in your heart and mind.

#### Prayer

Have a conversation with God (like a conversation with a friend) about what you've read, what you do and don't understand, what jumped out at you during meditation. Ask God, "What are you trying to tell me in this passage?"

#### Contemplation

The final step is less about you and more about God. As you read the passage again, listen to what God might be asking you to do in your life based off of this reading. Ask God how it may be calling you to change your life and faith walk. Read the passage again, this time let it steep within you. (God gets the last word.)
